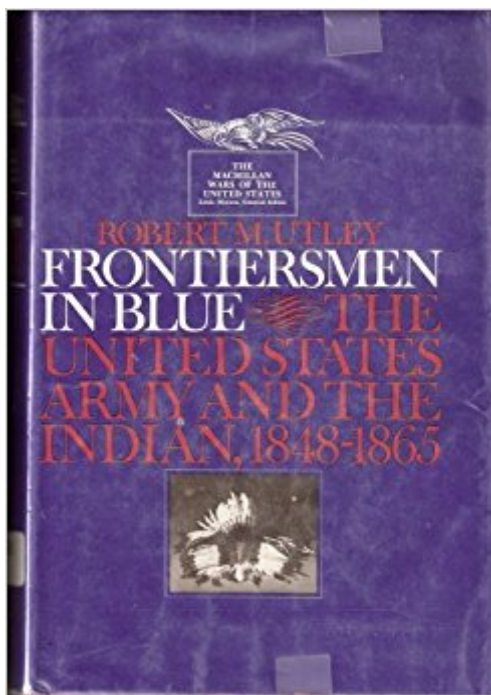

Robert M. Utley is recognized as one of the leading historians of the American West. He is the

author of the much-acclaimed *Billy the Kid: A Short and Violent Life*, published by the University of Nebraska Press in 1989, and of the award-winning books *Cavalier in Buckskin: George Armstrong Custer and the Western Military Frontier* (1988) and *High Noon in Lincoln: Violence on the Western Frontier* (1987), as well as the authoritative *Frontier Regulars: The United States Army and the Indian, 1866-1891* (also a Bison Book). --This text refers to an out of print or unavailable edition of this title.

Admittedly this is a work for a somewhat limited audience. However, if you have an interest in the topic, you would be hard pressed to find a better book on the subject. I first encountered Mr. Utley as one of the commentators on a series about the West on the History Channel. I found his narrative style much to my liking so I read his "Frontier Regulars" which covers the post Civil War period on the frontier. Reading that, I found that it was actually part 2 of a two book history with "Frontiersmen in Blue" being volume one. I highly recommend both volumes, and while I wish I had read "Frontiersmen in Blue" first, it's not really necessary. Mr. Utley does a wonderful job of personalizing the protagonists (on both sides) and his work seems to benefit from a wealth of research which he distills into a very readable account. He's also very even-handed in his praise and criticisms, although the works still seem to cant slightly to the Army/Government perspective. I feel that this speaks more to the relative scarcity of source material from Indian sources than to any bias on Mr. Utley's part. Overall, just a great, readable account of the struggles played out on the frontier between the end of the Mexican-American War and the American Civil War.

I read the sequel to this book, *Frontier Regulars: The United States Army and the Indian, 1866-1891* also by Utley, during a graduate level discussion course. I like it so much that I purchased *Frontiersmen in Blue* as a used book thru . I was not disappointed and read the book in a couple of days. The author does a good job of setting up the book and explaining his thesis in the opening chapter. He then spends the next few chapters covering soldiers, equipment and supply, and organization. The remainder of the book covers each area of the west from the end of the Mexican War to the Civil war, and then covers each area during the Civil war. There are good maps in the book that are necessary in following the many regions Utley divides the book into. If you enjoy reading and learning about the American west from the perspective of US army versus the Indians then this two book series is a great starting point for the aspiring historian. You will want to add other books dealing with the Indian perspective and for more detail on other aspects of frontier life.

Like its post Civil War era companion book by Robert Utley, "Frontier Regulars," "Frontiersmen in Blue" is provides an outstanding, detailed account of the U.S. Army and its supporting state units facing the Native nations on the Western frontier between the Mexican War and the end of the Civil War. It's a must, basic read for understanding the military actions and the related conflicts on the Frontier.
