

This book is both a workbook and a reference on how to write different types of texts in German. I used this primarily for the short story and German application sections. I like how there are multiple examples of these types of German writing, and it highlights what you should do and not do for these genres of writing. This is a good step by step book for learning specific German writing skills. This book is primarily written in German, with some (maybe 30%) written in English. I'd consider this an Intermediate German level book. It had exactly what I needed to learn, at a good price too.

Very helpful in learning to write German

I have yet to implement this with my level 4 German students (high school). But it looks like just what I was searching for. It has different types of assignments for students to do different types of writing. The assignments can be easily modified for different levels of difficulty.

I taught with this text last semester and found it quite well structured. It has a variety of genres to choose from, each one with activities and topics for three levels (Beginner, Intermediate, Advanced). I used this with some intermediate-advanced students, and so we skipped over the A (Beginner) sections in each chapter that we covered. There is a nice range of useful vocabulary included in each section along with activities that require students to practice this vocabulary. The chapters are furthermore beautifully scaffolded so that students work on smaller writing assignments (e.g. eine Inhaltsangabe) that directly relate to the final, more challenging task (z.B. eine Texterläuterung oder eine Kurzgeschichte-Interpretation). I did find that I had to supplement the text from time to time, especially for the Märchen section. Although there was one fairy tale included along with some useful activities, this was hardly sufficient exposure for the students before requiring them to write their own fairy tale. So I took perhaps five or so Grimm Märchen from the

internet. Similarly, when doing a film review we first started with the movie covered in the text (Bella Martha) and did the practice activities relating to that, before then choosing a second film for the main assignment. All in all, and especially because it appears to be the only text of its kind so far, I would highly recommend this for instructors. For students wishing to practice and improve on their own, this might not be as useful as it is a bit brief at times and could leave one feeling a bit overwhelmed or directionless. Additionally, not having anybody to check over your writing could make the whole exercise a bit futile. Overall, in my opinion, a great text!

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
