

This is a blog written over time that has simply been re-packaged into a book format. This format is not terrible, but could have benefitted by more editing. The facts and information are very useful, however the author seems to feel that the price of a beer is the most important piece of information, followed by the song stuck in his head. Overall, I think this book is worth reading if you're interested in this part of the world.

Mr. Gearhart does a good job of outlining some great research on cost of living here. The insight

into Panama especially is useful, practical and realistic. While it is more of an experience for a backpacking type of crowd, there's a lot here that will help anyone considering a move to Central America. This is a good addition to other research books for Panama, and the other countries visited. I recommend it.
